New to JazzArts Charlotte

azzArts Charlotte introduced two new staff positions in FY23. Dr. Patrick Brown joined us as the Education Director and Joseph Riggi joined us as the Digital Media Content Manager.

Before joining JazzArts Charlotte, Patrick was Assistant Professor of Music at Middle Georgia State University, where he directed the jazz ensemble, and taught

applied woodwinds, commercial music theory, and improvisation. Before his time in Georgia, Patrick taught at University of Nebraska at Omaha, Davidson College, Lenoir-Rhyne University, Union College, Wingate University, and Mitchell Community College. As a performer, he has shared the stage with

Introducing New Education Program: Nuestro Tiempo Latin Jazz Youth Ensemble

n spring 2022, JazzArts Charlotte piloted a new and free educational program, Nuestro Tiempo Latin Jazz Youth Ensemble. This program was made possible thanks to our supportive sponsors at BCBS NC and Arts & Science Council. Serving middle and high school students, both Latino American and non-Latino American, the program is designed to connect the community and educate students, celebrating the rich contributions and heritage of Latin Americans in jazz. Over 40 students participated in Nuestro Tiempo Latin Jazz Youth Ensemble in its first year!

Nuestro Tiempo (meaning "Our Time") provides students with a unique opportunity to play jazz orchestra repertoire and learn fundamentals including clave, improvisation, and Latin

jazz history. As a current student, Victoria shares, "What I love about the [Nuestro Tiempo] Latin Jazz ensemble is learning about the music of my heritage. I have so much fun." One of the special programmatic components for students in Nuestro Tiempo is learning about dance and rhythm. A whole session is dedicated to exploring Latin dance movements that correlate with the Latin and Afro-Cuban rhythms.

Outside of the benefits to students, JazzArts has had the opportunity to engage with partners within the Latinx community, including Camino Health Center and Latin American Coalition, providing diverse and accessible music instruction geared specifically towards the Hispanic American community, which is the fastest growing demographic in North Carolina.



39% of JazzArts Academy Students received scholarships OR free tuition for our programs.



JazzArts Youth Ensembles + Workshops

azzArts Charlotte's flagship educational program, Youth Ensembles + Workshops, soared to new heights by increasing student registration by 91% over the past year and reaching our highest enrollment in the history of the program. Serving middle and high school students, this program provides students with the opportunity to grow their individual skills within a supportive and relaxed ensemble environment while concentrating on exploring jazz styles, standard repertoire, jazz improvisation, and history. Additionally, students gain life skills by learning leadership, building confidence, and improving communication and social skills.

Lisa's son, Jason, has been with JazzArts for many years. As Jason graduates, Lisa reminisces, "His time with JazzArts Charlotte has been such a gift. His experience has not only helped him grow as a musician but inspired him to pursue a degree in Music Education. We will forever be grateful to each staff member, especially the musicians who generously shared their love of the art. As a parent, they seemed more [like] mentors than instructors."

102 students participated in Youth Ensembles + Workshops.

JazzArts Summer Music Camp

rom June 26 to 30th, students at Summer Music Camp learned jazz history, improvisation, and performance all while gaining self-confidence and creativity! These young musicians learned from some of the best jazz performers and educators from across our region (and beyond) and were joined by special guest clinician, award-winning and internationally acclaimed trombonist and educator, Wycliffe Gordon. JazzArts Charlotte was also thrilled to welcome Dr. Will Campbell, Director of Jazz Studies at UNC Charlotte.

For siblings and jazz vocal students, Clover and Peyton, this was their first-time attending camp. "To meet all these people who share [our] same interests is so cool!" The highlight of their week was working with jazz vocalist and JazzArts faculty member, Dawn Anthony, and performing with their peers in the camp's public performance on June 30th.

They were not the only students performing for the first time with JazzArts. This year, Summer Music Camp registration increased by 70% from last year and was our largest enrollment to date! We are grateful to our sponsors, donors, and partners at UNC Charlotte for helping to make our 2023 JazzArts Summer Music Camp an overwhelming success.







FREE Education Workshops



ne of the ways JazzArts bridges the gap between professional jazz performance and student education is through free JAZZ ROOM applied learning masterclasses and clinics. Throughout the year, international JAZZ ROOM artists teach these educational sessions, providing students from all backgrounds with rare and invaluable access to musical guidance/instruction, development strategies, and life lessons from some of the best jazz educators in the world.

In 2023, JAZZ ROOM international educators included: Drummer Jeff "Tain" Watts, Percussionist Pedrito Martinez, Flutist Itai Kriss, Clarinetist Even Christopher, Saxophonist Tia Fuller, and Pianist Emmet Cohen. These unique educational offerings provide local students with opportunities to learn from world-class jazz performers.

A parent shares, "I liked that my daughter got to witness a professional musician showing her what the clarinet could do if she sticks with it. I loved that [the workshop] challenged her to improvise on her own in front of a room full of strangers. She was nervous but I was so proud of her for doing it!" The experience of interacting with some the best musicians in the world is a distinctive opportunity that the JazzArts Academy provides to students in the Charlotte region and beyond!

Supporting Musicians to Keep Jazz Thriving

azzArts Charlotte is dedicated to ensuring that local and regional musicians can support themselves (financially) by doing what they love most of all, performing and teaching. In December, JazzArts produced its largest production to date. JazzArts Charlotte's "Nutcracker Swing" featured Duke Ellington and Billy Strayhorn's arrangement of Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite, under the musical direction of Grammy-winning trumpeter and Charlotte native, Ashlin Parker. The production also featured choreography from awardwinning choreographer Lula Elzy. JazzArts Charlotte hired 17 of the region's top jazz artists, 12 modern dancers (both local and national), and featured students from 3 of the JazzArts Academy's Jazz Youth Ensembles as a part of the threeday festivity.

Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker will always be a holiday favorite, but Duke Ellington's Nutcracker rendition is a new holiday favorite, made special because of its historic significance to America's classical music, Jazz. Irving Townsend, record producer for many jazz legends, wrote, "For the first time in Ellington history, Duke had decided to devote an entire album to arrangements of another composer's works instead of his own." These arrangements were very "personal," as in many Ellington compositions. The individual instrumental parts were written for specific musicians, with their unique playing strengths highlighted in the arrangements. Therefore, this music is highly challenging to many musicians and requires extensive study to recreate and perform authentically.

ince its inception, JazzArts Charlotte has been dedicated to bringing high-quality, world-class jazz entertainment to the Queen City, and in doing so, has built a thriving jazz audience. In response to the growing demand and community post-pandemic, JazzArts evolved its JAZZ ROOM programming to introduce a greater number of national and internationally renowned artists to Charlotte. Throughout the year, many of these jazz icons made their Charlotte debut with us, right here at the JAZZ ROOM!

Jazz music is a broad genre, and JazzArts Charlotte provides opportunities for not only audience members to enjoy the music, but for up-and-coming young musicians to learn from some of the best artists in the world. We thank you for playing a part in the future of this music and supporting live jazz in our community!

Romare Bearden Collaboration





azzArts Charlotte had the opportunity to partner with The Mint Museum during their exhibition of Picasso Landscapes: Out of Bounds and Bearden/Picasso: Rhythms and Reverberations. The exhibition examined the impact of Pablo Picasso's rich artistic practice on Romare Bearden and his work. Many people only know Bearden for his visual artwork, but he was less known as a lyricist and music composer of jazz compositions.

Through this partnership,
JazzArts held free public events at
The Mint Museum to provide contextual education relating to aspects of
the artists' work and its cross-section
with jazz music during that era. The
American Jazz in Paris program uncovered some of the musical sounds
of Montmartre, and the relationships
between jazz, symphonic jazz, and
modernism, as heard in Paris during
this distinct period in history.

As a culminating program of the exhibition, JazzArts Charlotte featured legendary jazz master, saxophonist Branford Marsalis and his ensemble for its May 2023 JAZZ



ROOM concert performance. Marsalis performed a unique program of his album, Romare Bearden Revealed, a tribute to the work of the famed Charlotte native artist. The performance also included Bearden's compositions, the most well-known selection, "Seabreeze." This was only the second time since the album's recording in 2003, that Marsalis has performed these works publicly.

As a part of the JazzArts Charlotte mission to "connect the cultural community", we are thrilled to collaborate with other Charlotte-based organizations and businesses. We believe that together, we can further enrich the community with high quality and unique educational creative and cultural programs for our community to enjoy.





Bringing Jazz to the Community

n important part of JazzArts Charlotte's mission is to help develop a thriving jazz audience in our community. One of the ways JazzArts does this is through the creation of new partnerships that expands opportunities to experience live and accessible jazz entertainment for everyone to enjoy. Last fall, we partnered with the Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS) on the "Ride with the Music" Program to present free live jazz performances along the Blue Line light rail stations across the city for the public to enjoy while moving through their busy days. These special pop-up public performances featured local and regional musicians and provided opportunities for several of our JazzArts Academy students to perform as well.



UNG CHARLOTT

azzArts Charlotte is proud to have a long-standing partnership with the College of Arts + Architecture at UNC Charlotte. In January 2022, the Department of Music's faculty members participated in a special JAZZ ROOM concert event called, "Bird Lives!" in recognition of UNC Charlotte's Charlie Parker 101 celebration. The performance featured Charlie Parker's well-known bebop compositions and selections rarely heard live from his Charlie Parker with Strings album. Additionally, JazzArts Charlotte's annual Summer Music Camp is hosted on the main campus of UNC Charlotte, allowing our student access to state of the art academic and music facilities.

Dr. Will Campbell, UNC Charlotte Director of Jazz Studies, shares, "The UNC Charlotte Department of Music has benefited greatly from our partnership with JazzArts Charlotte. In addition to us working together to host the annual Summer Jazz Camp, we greatly appreciate the invitation for our students to participate in JazzArts events. Charlotte is a much more "jazz friendly" town thanks to the vision and hard work of JazzArts!"







Diversity, Inclusion and Access

Since its inception, JazzArts Charlotte has been committed to creating an organizational culture and practices that support and enforce diversity, inclusion, and access. As an African American-led non-profit organization, it is intentional about incorporating practices of racial equity and diversity throughout our governance, operations, and programming.

As reflected in both performance curation and educational programs, JazzArts engages musicians and artists with racial balance and diversity front of mind. We are intentional about displaying content and balance that reflects the complex history of jazz music and the diverse cultures within our community today.

Access is also an important value for JazzArts Charlotte. To help ensure that our programs are accessible to the broadest range of people in our community, we work to lower barriers that may prevent participation by providing scholarships and free educational programs to youth as well as discounted and reasonably priced tickets for our JazzArts performance events.

JazzArts Charlotte Awarded Southern Cultural Treasure Funding

azzArts Charlotte is a proud recipient and member of South Art's inaugural cohort of Southern Cultural Treasures: a four-year initiative supporting Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) – led and – serving arts and cultural organizations throughout the Southeast.

As a member of the cohort, JazzArts receives a total of \$300,000 as multi-year funding, an additional project grant of \$7,500, access to provided consultants, and a network and community of like-minded organizations. Historically, arts and cultural organizations in the South have not received the same level of funding as other regions of the U.S. We are honored to join alongside our 16 cohort member organizations paving a way to bring change and representation to arts and culture in the South.


